SYLLABICATION GUIDE

- 1. Use The Syllable Division Teacher Guide to choose appropriate words.
- 2. Inform (S) that this is a strategy that will help them with vocabulary and word attack skills when they encounter an unfamiliar word.

How to Divide Two-Syllable Words:

- 1. Find the first two vowels (vowel sounds), underline them and label each with a V.
- 2. Draw a line (bridge) connecting the bottom of the two Vs, ex.: V__V.
- 3. Underline and label the letter(s) above the bridge with a C, ex.: VCCV.
- 4. Have (S) find pattern and divide word into syllables.
- 5. Have (S) label each syllable type (Cl, O, ME, VT, BR, C-le).
- 6. Have (S) read each syllable, then blend together into a word.
- 7. Check for comprehension or refer to dictionary for meaning.

How to Divide Words with Three or More Syllables:

- 1. Find the first two vowels (vowel sounds), underline them, and label with a V.
- 2. Draw a line (bridge) connecting the bottom of the two Vs, ex. V__V.
- 3. Underline and label each consonant with a C above the bridge. If there are three or more consonants, some consonants go together as one consonant unit (digraphs or blends).

Example: b <u>a th t u</u> b <u>V C C V</u>

- 4. Have (S) find pattern and divide word into syllables.
- 5. Check to see if there is another vowel that is not an e at the end of the word.
- 6. If so, cover up the letters before the second labeled vowel, find the next vowel, and label with a V.
- 7. With off hand still covering up to the second labeled vowel, draw a bridge connecting the bottom of the vowels.
- Label the consonant(s) above the bridge with a C, ex. <u>VCCV</u>.
- 9. Have **(S)** find pattern and divide word into syllables. If there is an additional vowel that is not an *e* at the end of the word, then go back to steps 6–8. If there are no additional vowels, then continue to steps 10–12.
- 10. Have (S) label each syllable type (Cl, O, ME, VT, BR, C-le).
- II. Have (S) read each syllable, then blend together into a word.
- 12. Check for comprehension or refer to dictionary for meaning. Be sure (S) can write or say a sentence using the new word.

Remember

If two consonants are in the middle of a word, split the word between the two consonants. (Exception: If the two consonants are a digraph [sh, ch, th], they cannot be split.) If there are three or more consonants, some letters go together as one consonant unit (look for known digraphs or blends).
